Firework Regulations 2004

Having been woken up at 11:45p.m. on Saturday, 4th July by a very noisy firework party that continued until 12:30 a.m. I am aware that many other people were disturbed and many pets upset. This is not acceptable and I have researched the regulations.

Firework Regulations 2004 prohibit the use of outdoor fireworks after 11p.m. at night other than hand held ones. The only exceptions are permitted firework nights, i.e. the Chinese New Year, 5th November, New Year's Eve, Diwali and at a national public celebration

Firework offences are dealt with by the Police and the Magistrates Court. There can be unlimited fines and in severe cases punishment by imprisonment up to 6 months. I hope that this is helpful.

On Saturday the 4th July, we set off fireworks behind the Community Centre to celebrate my son's wedding that day. Due to the popularity of the band, the music went on longer than originally intended, so the fireworks did not start till approximately 11.45pm (much later than planned).

Even though we did inform many households in the neighbourhood about the fireworks, they do appear to have upset some people in the community - something that was never intended. On behalf of the family, I would like to apologise for any inconvenience or distress the fireworks caused to anyone in the area (especially if pets and children were upset by the noise). This should not happen again as the Centre's conditions of hire actually prohibit the use of fireworks on the Centre's premises.

Bonfires & Flytipping

On the subject of fire and smoke, the editors have been asked by a reader to say something about **nuisance bonfires**. Obviously, we should all be aware of the annoyances and inconveniences we can cause by a badly-timed or badly-placed bonfire. The following is copied from Wiltshire Council's website:

'There are no byelaws restricting bonfires in Wiltshire Council's area. However, if smoke caused by a bonfire is creating a nuisance, the council has powers to take action under the provisions of the Environmental Protection Act 1990. Private individuals can also take action through a Magistrates' Court.

If you have a complaint, it is best to discuss it initially with the person responsible: they may not realise that they are causing a problem. Explain the details of your complaint and try to agree on a reasonable solution or compromise. If the situation does not improve, then contact our Public Protection department.'

Fly tipping can be reported by filling in the My Wiltshire online form on the Wiltshire Council website or, for the even more tec savvy, on the MyWiltshire app.

CHURCH AND CHAPEL NEWS

The view from my window: a few reflections from a retired vicar who loves rural ministry.

Summer; high summer, with flowers and fetes and open gardens and hay fever and all the rest of it. I don't know about you, but I find it difficult to imagine the darkness of winter, and lights going on at 5pm at this time of the year.

Summer; It's just such a liberating season; places to go and people to see; breakfast outside, and a gin and tonic listening to the birds at twilight. What an amazing country we live in. It's hard to think of anywhere more beautiful than the UK in June.

But our problem often is that we fail to notice. So much to do; so many difficulties and sadnesses to deal with, and if we spend our time listening to Radio 4 first thing in the morning, we might indeed all want to go back to bed. So how do we come to terms with the extremes of life even in this moderate country? At the time of writing, minute silences are being held for both the victims of the London bombings and the Tunisian victims and every day in our prayers we are anguishing with the migrants and the problems of Greece and so many other world situations. The age old argument returns again and again; where is God in all this? I hope I am wise enough not to give a glib answer, but at the end of the day I believe that God loves us and is steadfast. We are not robots pre-conditioned to set activities. We have free will - arguably our greatest gift and free will is always accompanied by unexpected events or accidents. The promise was not that they wouldn't happen, the promise was and is that God will be with us through it all, through thick and thin and that is my experience, as I emerge from a weekend of terrible news for a friend.

And so, on we go, and if that is the case, we can continue with our season of summer events safe in the knowledge that "All will be well" and we can continue with our community activities which include (not exclude) church events, particularly the new Benefice "Café Church", now being held on the first Sunday of every other month in Seend, (the next one is on September 6th.) If you don't know what a Café Church is, come and find out! I urge you all to be like the bees, buzzing around sniffing away at the enormous diversity of flowers, and bringing home their rich nectar, to do likewise; if you see what I mean.

I pray that our homes and hearts will be full of the wonder and diversity of creation, full of colour and light. Light overcomes darkness, it really does, and where would we be without bees?

SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

N.B. These notes are from the draft minutes of Parish Council meetings, and may not yet have been ratified.

The meeting held on **Tuesday 30th June 2015** was attended by nine Councillors with Mr J Padfield in the chair. Apologies received from Mr M Wiltshire. Also in attendance Cllr J Seed.

Cllr Seed said that developers of the Sandridge Solar Farm had won their appeal, and it would now remain to be seen if the development would go ahead; the subsidy per unit paid by the Government for energy generated had been reduced. Cllr Seed advised that a public meeting is being held in the Community Centre on 16th July at 7.30pm, co-hosted with the Chairman of the local Conservative branch.

Mr Murch, on behalf of the parish plan working group, asked about undertaking a housing survey. Cllr Seed advised thinking about what you want to come out of it, and to be careful about questions the council tell you to ask. For example, do you want social housing? If so, people have to qualify for it. Consider affordable housing and shared ownership development. People not eligible for social housing can go on to the open register and then be eligible for shared housing, this may be older people wanting to downsize. Councillors all agreed that, in principle, they are happy for the group to explore this.

Cllr Seed mentioned the Wiltshire Housing Site Allocations Plan (email from Georgina Clampitt-Dix 30th June), and suggested asking for someone from Spatial Planning to come along and explain about the settlement boundary (response required by 12th August), and to bear in mind that the parish boundary is different to the settlement boundary. Mr Murch said that at the recent consultation villages unanimously did not want development to take place in one of the SLHAA sites to the north of The Lye, but did not have such strong feelings about the other highlighted area just off School Road. Cllr Seed confirmed that the yellow highlighted areas represented sites for over 50 houses.

Cllr Seed reported that the work to the pinch point in Seend High Street should happen before Christmas, with the other half of the required funding coming from major transport grants.

Mrs Aldetha Raymond, the local Tree Warden, had come along to talk to Councillors about Ash dieback. She said there were no reports with DEFRA about the disease in the local area, and only one case reported in the West Country. She gave Councillors handouts, explaining the symptoms associated with the disease, and facts about reporting infected trees to the Forestry Commission, and managing infected trees and woodland. She explained that she had hoped to obtain free trees to plant, but there had not been sufficient community backing. The intention was to plant at Little Foxes, and for the trees to have identifying name plaques; this would enable children from the local school to understand about indigenous trees and the environment. Mrs Raymond confirmed that Ash seedlings should not be taken out of their local area and re-planted, and that there was currently a ban on importing Ash trees. Mr Rigg proposed that the PC support Mrs Raymond 's efforts to obtain and plant trees locally, agreed by the other Councillors. Mrs Raymond also wanted to confirm that she had tried to contact the PC by email, following the March PC meeting, and had also telephoned and left a message.

Sandridge Solar – Following the upholding of Sandridge Solar Power's appeal, an email had been received from StJohn Hughes, Director, enclosing an agreement to be signed and returned. This related to the Community Benefit Fund to help support local community projects aimed at economic, social and environmental improvement in the area. Councillors discussed whether or not to accept monies from the Fund but felt that, as the percentage was undeclared and that there were other conditions that were too vague, they felt unable to commit the parish to the terms as presented, and needed time to consult on whether to accept. It was agreed not to respond straight away, but to put onto the agenda for the next meeting.

Canal bridge, Seend Cleeve – The Clerk confirmed that the potholes had now been filled in. Concern was again expressed about the state of repair of the bridge. The Clerk to get confirmation that the repair work would be undertaken, as agreed, in November, and also that a one-way system would be put in place through Seend Cleeve from the Pelch to The Stocks.

Neighbourhood Plan – Mrs A'Bear reported that the two consultation events had now taken place. About 60 people had attended the Wednesday event and there had been a lively atmosphere; a 20 minute presentation had taken place. On Saturday afternoon there had been a steady flow of visitors. The reaction had been very positive and there had been good feedback; everyone appeared engaged and interested. There was now a need to work out a budget to carry things forward. There is another meeting in about 3 weeks, and they will come back to the PC with costings. Mrs A'Bear said that Lizzie Simes, who had undertaken the landscape analysis, now had to stand down due to other work commitments. Steve Vaux had also done a very good job on the presentation.

High Street crossing - Email sent to Andy Cadwallader. He advises that any requests for dropped kerbs need to go through the Area Board CATG meeting for approval and funding. He has inspected the area and visibility from Church Lane is very restricted and it may be more suitable to encourage pedestrians to cross further east of the lane. If the parish want to progress the project then Mark Stansby should be approached to look at the site; also bear in mind there may be land ownership issues.

BT Openreach – their website currently advises that Seend is enabled for Superfast Fibre, but the cabinet is not ready yet, so orders can't be placed. It is in their plans to be upgraded and info is updated weekly on the website.

Planning Applications No: 15/043948/FUL Seend School, School Road Erection of a temporary structure for use as a canopy for an outdoor play area Councillors discussed and voted unanimously in favour of this application.

Application No: 15/05351/FUL Rowbarns, 1 Seend Cleeve Proposed front extension

Councillors discussed and voted unanimously in favour of this application.

Application No: 15/05885/FUL Home Farm, Bell Hill Non load bearing agricultural building

Comment from a Councillor that she would like to see solar panels installed on the roofs of new farm buildings. It was pointed out that it depended on the location of the building, as it was not always practical to keep panels clean in some areas on very high buildings. The Clerk to contact Wiltshire Council, to ask what their policy is with regard to solar panels on new buildings.

Councillors discussed and voted unanimously in favour of this application.

Right of reply, Mr Hawkins – Mr Hawkins' email concerning his application for holiday accommodation at Wych Elm had been circulated to all Councillors, together

with a link to details of the application on the Wiltshire Council website. Councillors discussed and agreed that the comments they had made in response to this application at the 28th April meeting were made in the light of information available to them at the meeting, but acknowledged that the speed limit on Seend Hill outside Wych Elm is 50 mph, not 60 mph.

Parking, Spout Lane – Email received from a resident of Sells Green, to advise that he is finding it increasingly difficult to park safely as visitors to the caravan and camp site use the road, although there is parking available on site. The Clerk to write to the caravan site to ask them to draw this to visitors' attention.

Ownership of Rusty Lane – Mr Bryan (Lye Field Committee) was present, and asked to draw some facts to the attention of the Parish Council. He advised records indicate that the land over which the green lane (Rusty Lane) runs was given to the parish in 1928 by Major Bell; unfortunately the deeds could not be found. He had ascertained that Wiltshire County Council had claimed ownership of the lane at the time that the 'new' Dial Close had been built, as they wanted to run services to the houses. The Parish Council maintained this green lane from 1928 until the building of 'new' Dial Close. In the February minutes set out in April 2015 Spotlight it is asserted that the Lye Field, the WI and the Community Centre own the land over which Rusty Lane runs. This is not the case, and it is not in the interest of any group that this statement in the Parish Council minutes (a public document) is unchallenged.

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Wiltshire Council News from Jonathon Seed

Wiltshire Council business continues throughout the summer. During the past month we started the process of setting next year's Budget and are continuing the process of delivering more with less - knowing that less means another severe cut in central Government funding to the Council. The delicate financial balancing act that the Council has to perform in recent years is becoming increasingly difficult to achieve by annual reductions in back office support and sooner or later the Council is going to have to address what we can and cannot do and probably cut out what we can no longer afford to do.

Wiltshire Council will need to take a long hard look at which services have value for all residents and which services can still be afforded. Inevitably some services that have been taken for granted and which have not been services accessed by all of the community may have to be withdrawn or paid for by those that use them. We have recently seen this process with the introduction of green waste collection charges and this will make a difference of some £3million to the Council Budget.

We are also trying to help to get the local economy moving and in many areas this includes house building as an economic enabler. Everyone wants to see the County economy grow but few are willing to accept housing developments in their own backyard, in towns and villages alike. In our Community Area we can see that advantage where Melksham has seen from the construction of over 2000 houses by 2026 with the result being the building of two new schools, four new or expanded "in town" supermarkets, hardly an empty shop in the High Street and a new Community Campus being built by 2017 plus business moving to the town from other areas. Perhaps we should contrast the growth and improvements that Melksham has achieved in the last few years with the angst being experienced in other local towns that have yet to embrace similar expansion in housing numbers with the commensurate failure to achieve commercial or infrastructure improvements.

Similar but smaller scale considerations will have to be undertaken by our larger parishes as they consider whether to embrace proposals for small village house building schemes currently under discussion. It is important that locals have their say on this so if you have not seen what is being proposed then please find out from your Parish Council and have your say.



I had the very good fortune to be able to watch the local derby match between Seend and Keevil on 14th July, a dull and damp Sunday.

The Seend team, understandably, is well represented by Seend inhabitants, but so too is Keevil. Their line up on Sunday was captained by local Seend boy Josh Hamblin; Kevin and Chris Waylen playing for Seend but

Dick Waylen, usually, but not on this day, performing for Keevil; Freddie Goddard lining up for Seend but his brother Paris turning out for Keevil, such are the local divided loyalties !

Seend went into bat first and, despite numerous showers and the consequential retreats to the pavilion, put up what looked like an unbeatable score of 248 with Mark Wiltshire and Tom Wallis notching up 50 and 35 respectively.
